ATTENDEES: normal group, Dr Wallerstein chaired meeting

MEETING AGENDA/OBJECTIVES: Review negative security assurances, no first use, and nuclear free zone issues.

### MAJOR CONTRIBUTORS:

- No first use/negative assurances.

-- Dr Wallerstein: Requirement to sustain or reduce weapons in NATO is major requirement of this group.

-- Col Shannahan: Most countries who want negative assurances, express such statements as "no first use on me." Hot topic in international community in regards to NPT.

-- Dr Wallerstein asked if positive security assurances/no first use statements would bring borderline countries into fold.

- Group not sure if chem/bio should be captured under NSA/PSAs.

-- Ms Johnson provided review of nuclear free zone issues before government.

--- South Pacific

---- Conditions for support remain: language similar to negative security assurances, doesn't impede US transit or visit options, regional internal initiative.

---- Doesn't believe free zones will have much impact on NPT.

--- African nuclear free zone

--- Above comments apply.

---- Still drafting language, based on South American model.

  - --- Group response: No.
- -- Col Shannahan: Forward presence of force and nuclear weapons are underpinning of NATO security guarantees.
- -- Dr Altfeld: Forward deployed weapons provided trigger mechanism (use/or lose weapons); nondeployed systems present timelines problem in perceptions of adversary.
